

Geese roundup aims to protect York reservoir

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YORK, Maine -- Federal and York Water District officials took measures on Wednesday, June 14, to protect the drinking reservoir at Chases Pond from potential threats of future fecal contamination caused by migrating geese.

According to Don Neumann, the director of operations for the York Water District, it was a proactive move to call on the services of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Wildlife Service out of Augusta to round up a group of nine geese for relocation.

Water Resource Protection Manager Gary Stevens said on Wednesday, about a month ago 30 transient geese flew into the pond threatening the water quality with the droppings which they leave behind. The roundup was a measure to research alternatives as the number of migrating geese increases.

"Some geese will come back but a lot of them will stay where we put them," said Kirk Shively, Wildlife Disease Biologist for the department.
